Screening for Child Trauma Using the Child Trauma Screen	<p>Tuesday, March 23 12:00 pm to 1:00 pm Register here</p>	<p>Many children suffer from trauma in silence and alone. Screening is a way to identify children that are experiencing high levels of distress and may need additional support to overcome trauma exposure. Screening is also important to facilitate discussions with youth and caregivers about trauma, to provide factual information about traumatic stress, and to offer a range of resources to families, including evidence-based treatment when indicated.
