Q1 LOC Reviewed and Findings

- 100 Inpatient Psych
- 140 Inpatient Psych (extended)
- 150 Inpatient D&A
- 200 Non-Hospital D&A

Q2 LOC Reviewed and Findings

- 300 Outpatient Psych
- 325 Partial Psych
- 350 Outpatient D&A
- 600 Ancillary Lab Services

Q3 Programs to be Reviewed

- 425- IBHS, 450 –Host Homes, 600 Ancillary Lab Services, 700 Ancillary: Other Psychiatric
- Q4 Programs to be Reviewed
 - 500 RTF, 550 RTF Non-Accredited , 750 Reinvestment,
 800 Community Support Psychiatric

Why Do We Need A Compliance Plan?

CBH Requirement

- Maintain a corporate compliance program in accordance with standards set forth in the CBH Provider Manual to prevent and protect against fraudulent billing, embezzlement of funds, waste, and abuse.
- CBH Provider Manual (5.3.2) states,
 "Providers are reminded that the CBH
 Provider Agreement requires them to have a
 written Compliance Plan. The seven
 elements of an effective compliance plan
 include..."

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Why Is A Compliance Plan Important

Compliance Plans (Best Practice / Benefit)

- False Claims Act risk mitigation
- Federal Sentencing Guidelines for Organizations relief in the event of wrongdoing
- Clear guidelines reduce risk of non-FCA violations
- Mitigation of reputational risk/harm
- Ally with line staff in identifying risk/violations early

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What Is A Compliance Plan?

- Plan is the written summary/organization of a compliance program
- Things to note
 - Healthcare entities have enhanced risk without effective compliance programs
 - Presence of the plan is not sufficient, implementation and adherence is key
 - No one size fits all/most template
- The 7 elements of an Effective Compliance
 Program

What Is A Compliance Plan?

The 7 Elements: A closer look

- Implementing Written Policies and Procedures
- 2. Designating a Compliance Officer and/or Committee
- 3. Effective Training & Education
- 4. Open Lines of Communication
- 5. Enforcement and Disciplinary Guidelines
- Risk Assessment, Internal Auditing & Monitoring
- 7. Prompt Response to Offenses and corrective actions
